



GRID Alternatives' Disadvantaged Communities - Solar Affordable Housing Program (DAC-SASH)

GRID Alternatives is a **mission driven non-profit that serves exclusively low-to-moderate income families**. GRID Alternatives is the statewide Program Manager and Installer for the Disadvantaged Communities Single-Family Affordable Solar Homes (DAC-SASH) program under the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC).

Homeowners qualified to receive solar with GRID are eligible for a no-cost solar system that saves 50-90% on a family's electric bill.

The DAC-SASH program offers incentives for solar electric systems to income-qualified homeowners living in certain areas and neighborhoods of San Francisco served by Pacific Gas and Electric (PG&E) and CleanPowerSF. In addition to providing incentives, GRID's program is uniquely structured to promote and provide energy education, workforce development and solar job training opportunities along with broad community engagement.

Households must meet the three criteria below to be eligible for GRID's services (see "Determining Eligibility"). Households that qualify for GRID's program must apply for GRID's program and may not apply for the GoSolarSF Low-Income Non-SASH incentives. As the Program Manager for the DAC-SASH, GRID Alternatives has the sole authority to determine and confirm eligibility. **Contact GRID Alternatives** in one of the following ways:

Note: If the household does not qualify for GRID's program - but qualifies for a GoSolarSF Supplemental Low-Income Non-SASH incentive - the property owner should refer to the GoSolarSF Certified Installer List (visit www.solarsf.org and click on "Certified Installer List") to get bids from at least three solar installers. The GoSolarSF Certified Installer will assist with the GoSolarSF application process.

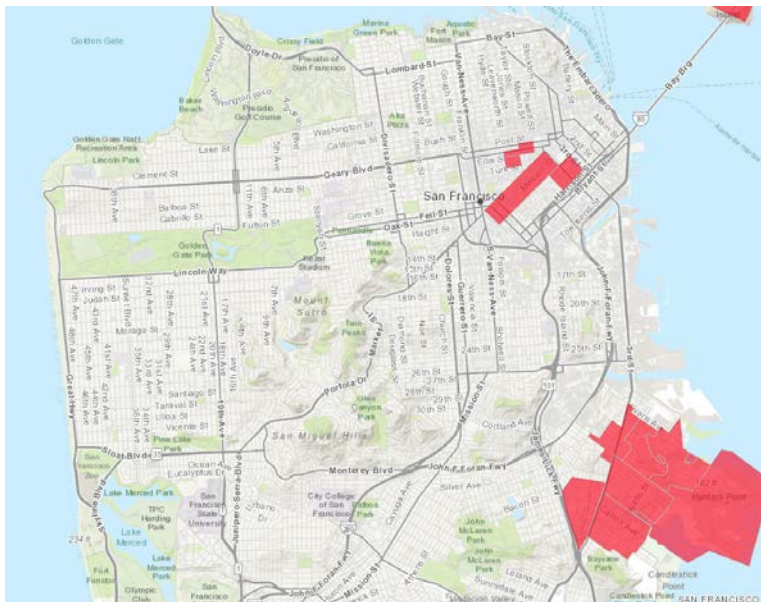
Determining Eligibility

A household is *likely* eligible for GRID's services if the following cumulative criteria are met:

- 1) Home is occupied by the homeowner;
- 2) Total household income is at or below the maximum annual income limits (see table below); and
- 3) Home is in a qualified area: see red areas in map below
